'Hello! My name's Marsali. I'm a 10-year-old girl who helps out at church as an altar server along with my best friend Maeve. I live in Bernisdale with my Mum, Dad and cat Toby. I also have two older brothers - Domhnall who is living in Barra with my grandparents. He's currently waiting to turn 18 so he can live his dream of working on a boat. And Innes, who lives in Edinburgh, studying History and Politics. He is living in his own flat which is huge and is handy to use as a hote!! Some things I like are green, pandas and meatballs!'

Hi my name's Maeve and I'm ten years old. I live in Borve near Portree. I have been going to St Mary's church all my life. I live with my Mum, Dad and two brothers, Paddy and Somhairle. Paddy is eight years old and Somhairle is twelve, but I'm not going to say my Mum and Dad's ages. We have two kittens as well, Misty and Sooty.

I altar serve with my best friend Marsali. Marsali and I have different jobs. We light the candles before the start of Mass. To start Mass, Marsali rings the bell which is at the back of the church and everyone stands up. Then I lead the way, carrying the cross, ahead of Deacon Tony, Father Ronald and Marsali. When Father Ronald says "Let Us Pray" Marsali carries a book called "the Missal" up so that he can say a prayer out of it.

Marsali also has a job that she must bring a bowl of water up to Father Ronald and pour some on his hands. I have a job in the middle of Mass where I have to ring the bells four times. This happens because it is a very important part of the Mass. After that we receive Holy Communion. At the end of Mass, Marsali and I put out the candles. We call the thing that we put out the candles with "the snuffer- outer". We have teas and coffees and cake after Mass.

I love being a part of St Mary's church. All the people that go to it are soooo nice and it's a bonus that I get to altar serve with Marsali as well!
